



Beaver Protection Update



groups, including a compelling letter written by leadership team member Peg Herring representing our Broadband, the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission rejected the petition to close recreational beaver killing on the state's federally managed public lands. Instead, the Commission adopted rules to implement the "Beaver Bill" (HB 3464) that will remove beavers' designation as a predatory animal. The Bill, passed by the 2023 Oregon State Legislature, directs ODFW to manage beaver on private land and continue with a stakeholder workgroup. They did not establish a timeline for this process or commit to future action. Peg states, "Some progress but not much."

- On June 21, the US Forest Service released their draft Environmental Impact Statement for amending forest plans to protect old-growth trees and forests from logging. The Climate Forest Campaign is working on an analysis and materials to help the public weigh in during the public comment period (ending September 20).
